Kitimat Lodge Fishing Report “Fishing the Skeena Steelhead Highway” October 29, 2011

Late October is now upon us and frost is on the Pumpkin. As you can see in the pictures below there is no frost on these happy anglers, as the Skeena River has produced another great run of summer fish, including a nice run of Northern Coho. The past few weeks have not been that easy as the Kalum River has been very milky from a slide, visibility next to zero. We did manage a nice buck Steelhead the few days we fished her. We concentrated our efforts on the Steelhead Highway and produced Steelhead with sea lice. Every fish was chrome bright and the Char were in large numbers creating continuous bites. The Coho were also larger than average and again all sea liced, indicating these fish are fresh fresh fresh. A huge highlight was the fly caught 35lb record steelhead, unfortunately the fish did not want to cooperate and got out of the net and snapped off before we got a picture, our client said it all, its head was the same size as yours! By far the biggest fish our lodge has recorded.

Fishing out of the Douglas Channel in Kitimat has produced Winter Springs and Crab for our clients that want that small window of Salmon and Crab before winter hits and stays. We will be putting together a season in review video and picture display sometime during the winter and I plan to report as the winter progresses on the Steelhead fishery for our arriving spring guests.

Our 2011 season has been another great success and we have also added another ocean fishing vessel to our fleet for 2012 making our services fully operational to provide all tours to the outside of the West Coast for salmon and halibut. 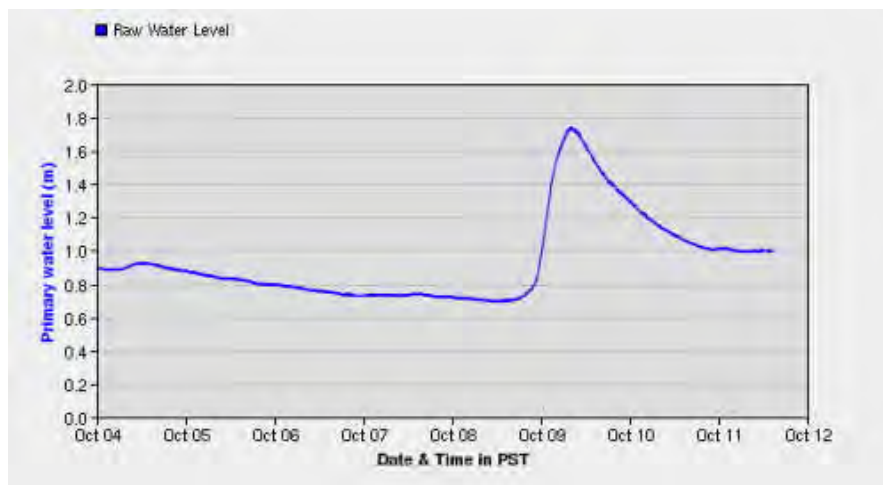

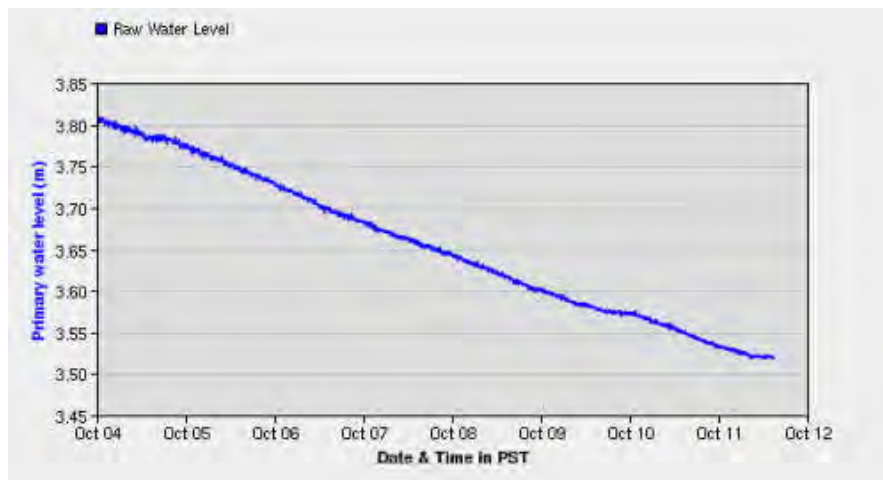

Robin Rowland - Visual Journalism and Editorial

Robin Rowland, the editor and publisher of **Northwest Coast Energy News**, first encountered the northern British Columbia wilderness as a toddler on the shores of Ootsa Lake. After a short time in Vancouver, his family moved to Kitimat, where his father Fred, was the assistant property manager for Alcan. For the first two years, the family lived in the old Smeltersite (where from time to time his father would go fishing with others with Haisla guides on Douglas Channel and take the kid along). After that the Rowland family moved to main the Kitimat townsite. After seven years in Kitimat, the family moved to Toronto where Fred Rowland joined the development department of the booming city. Robin attended York University and then studied journalism at Carleton. He worked as a reporter photographer for the *Sudbury Star* and later was hired by CBC News, where he would work for most of his career (with gaps for travel, book writing and six years at CTV News). In 1996, he joined the new CBC news online division. In 1998, he was named web producer for The National and in 2003 became photo editor for CBC News. In 2010, Robin decided to take early retirement and return to northern British Columbia to pursue his interests in photography and writing.

Robin is co-author with James Dubro of *King of the Bootleggers*, about organized crime during the Prohibition era and a follow-up. *Undercover Cases of the RCMP's Most Secret Operative*. In 1995, Rowland co-wrote, with Dave Kinnaman, of Washington State, the first book on how to do research on the Internet. In 2000, Robin wrote *The Creative Guide to Research*. His latest book, published in 2008 is *A River Kwai Story: The Sonkrai Tribunal*.

He founded Northwest Coast Energy News in 2011 as an independent, neutral news website covering all aspects of the environmental and energy issues facing northwest British Columbia from the perspective of the northwest.

Robin also continues to freelance for major media, including CBC News and the Canadian Press picture service. As a freelance photographer he is available for editorial, wilderness and commercial assignments throughout the northwest region. The article, published in the journal *Forests*, says that if timber from north-western U.S. forests were harvested sustainably every 45 years and the wood used as a building material, where possible replacing substances like concrete or steel, which require greater amounts of fossil fuels to manufacture, that would both remove existing carbon dioxide from the air while the forest was growing and then keep the gas entering the atmosphere for years as long as it is part of a building.

Odd decision

Bob phoned. I returned his call.

How's your season going? he asked.

Slow, I said.

It's been fair here, said Bob.

Here, to Bob is the Kispiox. His house is set high on a bank above the river. The shop where Bob crafts bamboo rods is a short cast away.

There's a rumour that the Ministry folks may open the Thompson to fishing and bait, I said.

Bait? from the tone of his voice, I sensed he couldn't believe it.

My friend Pete went down and fished Date Creek yesterday, Bob said.

He fished hard and lost one fish. At the end of the day an Indian carrying a casting rod and a bucket of bait showed up and asked Pete if he could fish through. Pete said he was done and told the guy to go ahead. On his first cast the Indian hooked a steelhead and killed it. On his next cast he hooked another but lost it. Two casts later he lost another.

Yeah, I said, recalling the time when I watched as Mike Whelpley use bait to land 70 steelhead in two days.

None of the salmon rivers in the rest of Canada allow bait, I added. Why, in the name of conservation and common sense do we allow it here?

Not long after my conversation with Bob, I opened my e-box and learned the BC Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (FLNRO) had indeed opened the Thompson River to steelheaders allowing them to use bait. Thompson steelhead are legendary. Until three years ago it was the preferred destination of resident steelheaders and steelheaders the world over. The historic abundance of those hard fighting Thompson fish is unknown, but it was probably considerably more than the figure of 10 thousand that was bandied about.

Salmon eggs were the preferred lure for Thompson River steelhead through most of the river's angling history. The fact that there is a significant mortality associated with the use of roe wasn't an issue during the 50s, 60, and 70s since anglers killed their catches within the legal limits. The fishing managers then were under the impression that there were far more steelhead in all the province's streams than they later discovered there was. The latter realization led to catch and release restrictions and bait bans on many streams. Curiously, the Thompson was one of the last steelhead streams to be declared a catch and release fishery. Stranger still, the use of bait continued.

The imposition of a catch and release fishery dramatically reduced angler impact on Thompson steelhead, but for over a hundred years the net fisheries in the Fraser and at sea and hundreds of years of exposure to the native fisheries were taking their toll on Thompson steelhead. While this was happening, critical spawning habit was under pressure from cattle and the demand for water by ranchers. Not surprisingly, the steelhead population collapsed. Estimates of under a thousand fish surfaced.

The Ministry of the Environment, operating under the management strategy it had adopted in 1996 that established a hierarchy of managerial principles with an emphasis on the precautionary approach to fish management – one that placed the maintenance of a fish populations over social and economic benefits – closed the Thompson to steelhead angling. The managers promised to open the fishery again if the run size estimate reached 1250 fish. Considering that there used to be in excess of ten times as many steelhead returning to the river, this benchmark seemed far too low to many of us who believe that the only sensible way to manage fish is to err heavily on the side of caution to have a better chance of protecting wild fish populations.

For two years the fishery was closed. This year a few steelhead showing up in the test fishery at Albion and in a chum fishery somehow led Robert Bison of the Ministry of Forest Lands and Natural Resources Operations to conclude there is a 50 per cent chance that the 1250 target figure may be reached. Based on this wildly optimistic and scientifically inexact conclusion, FLNRO opened the fishery, ignoring the fact that if there was a 50 per cent chance the steelhead would reach the target figure, there was a 50 per cent chance they wouldn't.

At the end of the day, the people charged with reducing the harm to Thompson Steelhead presided over a bait fishery on an endangered species. The ramifications of this decision will be far reaching and of no help to Thompson steelhead, and will do considerable damage to the credibility of fisheries management staff.

Fish farm harm

When I first heard about fish farming I thought of inland ponds filled with catfish. Then I learned that people were raising salmon in pens in the sea. BC had experimented with the practice but after a short run the industry failed.

At the time, The Steelhead Society of BC was campaigning against the overfishing of salmon stocks on the approaches to the Fraser, Skeena, and Nass rivers.

My fellow steelheaders and I did discussed whether this ocean based animal husbandry might offer an alternative to the plunder of wild fish stocks and ultimately supplant the environmentally reprehensible and economically bogus practice of chasing salmon around the sea with nets.

Chris Bennett, a lanky young sandy-haired salt water guide, was the first to raise doubt about fish farming. Chris made the trip from Central Coast to Vancouver every year to attend the Annual General Meeting of the Steelhead Society. He fished the waters in and around the Broughton Archipelago. His excursions took him to the former sites of fish farms that were part of the failed enterprise I mentioned earlier.

Those places are dead zones, he told me. We never catch fish there.

I remember his words precisely. Dead zone is an evocative term, when used to describe part of the ocean. It took me back to the time when I was kid fishing Burrard Inlet, when we watched beaches and parts of the sea floor shorn of life by oil spills and wood waste from logging booms.

I wasn't troubled by those concerns until I heard that the provincial government was entertaining the idea of reintroducing aquaculture in our coasts. At that time, two members of the Steelhead Society's German Branch arrived in BC. They were avid anglers of Atlantic Salmon, an avocation that took them to Norway, which had the finest Atlantic salmon rivers in Europe. The Germans told us that Norway had lost its best salmon streams due to the invasion of farmed fish escapees carrying disease they passed to wild stocks.

At that time I was certain that fish farming posed so many problems that it wasn't worth pursuing, but thanks to the environmentally challenged corporatists in the Liberal Party, we were saddled with them anyway.

I can't think of a single instance where the introduction of an exotic species has brought good to a local environment, but despite our protests, the BC Libs introduced Atlantic Salmon to the Pacific coast. A few sea surges later, some of those fish escaped. Hearing of this, I phoned Mike Lough, of the Ministry of the Environment, for confirmation. He told me that the catch of Atlantic salmon had exceeded that of steelhead on Vancouver Island's Salmon River that year.

Are they spawning? I asked.

Well, said Mike, if they're driven by the same biological imperatives as every other organism in the biosphere, they probably are.

Another big strike against salmon farming, but not the biggest. A few year later I came across the work of Alexandra Morton and John Volpe who had zeroed in on the fact that sea lice which bred abundantly in salmon farms were sucking the life blood from migrant pink salmon who had the misfortune of migrating within spitting distance of salmon farms.

Following this revelation came a heated debate. A debate, I thought, what debate? Why is there a debate, when one has only to phone or email Norway and ask them about sea lice? If you do that the Norwegian fisheries authorities tell you that, sea lice pose a serious problem to wild fish and that the fact that they do is the reason they fine farms that are especially lousy.

Killing the ocean floor; introducing exotic species; putting wild species at risk: It seemed abundantly clear to me that anyone with a modicum of common sense would recognize the absurdity of fish farming, then Yvon Chouinard added another nail to the coffin.

Yvon is very rich because he is very smart. He is living proof that smart guy can get rich and influential on the strength of brain power, creativity and hard work. Sure all the environmental ills associated with fish farming are important, said Yvon, but the average citizen is not aware of them. What those folks are concerned about is what they are feeding their kids.

I looked into it. When you contain so many creatures in close quarters, dye and fungicides are the order of the day. Oh yeah, and the end product doesn't come close to the real deal when you want a salmon meal.

Farm harm two

The introduction of alien species is fraught with peril. Examples are legion. For instance, some dolt empties the contents of his aquarium into some insignificant waterway in the midwestern US, and before you can say Jack Sprat, Eurasian Tiger fish large enough to knock down a man in an open boat (which some of them do) are hurtling toward the Great Lakes at neck breaking speeds to the alarm of wildlife officials on both sides of the world's longest undefended border.

Daguerreotypes of Haida elders picture them against a backdrop of tropical shrubbery that no longer exists thanks to the depredations of fallow deer introduced to the misty isles by misguided Englishmen yearning for game that would evoke memories of hunting in their homeland.

And, speaking of Haida Gwaii, Langara Island off that archipelago's northern tip was the site of the largest rodent extermination ever, an eradication necessitated by the discovery that Norwegian rats brought there by ship were about to wipe out one of the world's largest colonies of ancient murrelets. When Eurosettlers all but exterminated the bison and introduced an exotic animal known as the cow to Western North America, they unleashed a destructive force that profoundly altered the prairie landscape. Had they cultivated the Bison instead, the animal programmed to thrive in its native environment – an animal that doesn't chomp indigenous grasses roots and all or trample streams denuded of riparian vegetation to the point where they are no longer viable biological entities – the prairies would still be wonderful diverse grasslands and calamities like the dust bowl would not have happened. [Ted Turner](#), father of CNN, is, with 2 million acres of personal ranch land, the largest single land holder on this continent. In his quest to meld economic viability with economic sustainability, Turner did a simple thing: he kicked cows off his land and brought in Bison. Like moose, Bison crop grasses. They are hard wired against overgrazing. That smart move, and the reintroduction of native plants, has turned Turner's lands into the prairie of yore.

The most dramatic and cataclysmic introduction of alien species in history began when Homo Sapiens of the Euro variety hit the shores of North America in search of yellow metal. On his first assault, Cortez was easily beat back by the Aztec. On his second, the same greedy conquistador was astounded by the ease with which his Spanish force overcame the formerly mighty Aztec army, ultimately attributing his triumph to god's will.

Since then we've learned it wasn't god's will at all but the ineluctable will of another irresistible invisible force, namely diseases borne of animal husbandry. Crossover plagues, like tuberculosis and small pox, diseases carried by conquistatorial vectors, had killed untold millions on two continents since Cortez' initial assault, making villages of cities and transforming villages to tribes on the two continents that now bear the name of [Amerigo](#).

With all this historical precedent - and much more besides – at hand, you might think that your provincial government would be averse to the importation of alien species into your province's environment. Nope. The liberals under convicted felon, Gordie Campbell, did just that, when they introduced Atlantic Salmon into our Pacific waters. More than a few of us, including yours truly, warned publicly that introducing exotica into our offshore was courting disaster. but because they are corporate fascists with no concern for public opinion, the hybrid neoconservative party known as the Liberal Party of BC introduced the alien species nonetheless.

So, here we are in 2011 and fisheries scientists have discovered a couple of native salmon juveniles carrying a salmon anemia, ISA, that heretofore was alien to this coast. The anemia is brought on by a virus that is well known to fish farms in eastern Canada, Chile, Scotland, and Norway. It doesn't take a super sleuth to figure out that to get here ISA required a mode of transport, a vector, and that the transmitter had to have been an exotic fish from away. And where do we find such fish? If you said fish farms, move to the front of the class.

The scary thing is that ISA has the potential to destroy Pacific salmon, leading us to the inescapable conclusion that the only way to prevent that from happening is to close ALL salmon farms on this coast immediately. Failure to do so will ultimately result in replacing wild evolutionary programmed salmon that will feed us in perpetuity with exotic salmon of questionable nutritional value that are subject to massive collapse.

Safety and survival on water:

A good set of Oars and Oar Locks is NOT just for Drift-Boaters:

The smartest thing you can do is install a good set of oars and oar locks in your jet-boat and learn how to use them. If your engine quits just snap in your oars and turn your jet boat into a drift boat and either row to shore or float to the boat launch. I have had to do this a few times myself when I was guiding. I've seen too many jet boats and all they have is puny paddles. One person with one paddle is useless and even two persons with two paddles are difficult to control a large or even a small jet boat. Throw those paddles away and get yourself a good set of oars and oar locks. **Do it now! It may save your life.** Drifting out of control into a sweeper, log jam or boulders is no fun. [Contact me anytime](#) and I will be happy to give you tips how to row your jet boat.

Attention Anglers Cold Water Kills:

The waters of British Columbia are cold year-round.

If you fall in the water, remember the 1 – 10 – 1 Principle

YOU HAVE:

- 1 minute to get your breathing under control;
- 10 minutes before you are too numb to hold on or to tread water effectively; and
- 1 hour before you become unconscious due to hypothermia.

PREVENT COLD WATER SHOCK:

- Always wear your lifejacket on board. Make sure it fits properly and is in good working order.
- Check the weather before departing.
- Don't overload your boat.
- Always tell someone where you are going and when you expect to return.

Over 90 percent of anglers who die while boating are not wearing a lifejacket. When you fall overboard, a lifejacket stored under your seat will do little to save your life.

Anglers are reminded to carry proof of competency such as a **Pleasure Craft Operator Card** on board at all times.

Do this to your life jackets NOW:

Sew on an elongated pocket on the back and near the bottom edge of all your life jackets. Have either a zipper or Velcro closer. The pocket should be clearly labelled with large letters:

SURVIVAL ITEMS ONLY

You should put the following items into the pocket:

- Silver space blanket
- Fire starter
- Water-proof matches/lighter

- Candle
- food/candy
- Pocket knife, etc

These items can be vacuumed packed so your pocket does not have to be water proof. Actually some drain holes in the bottom may be a good idea.

Anything that will help a person survive at least one night and not die of hypothermia is a good idea, I think.

Thank you and please be safe...
